MESSAGE

From Our Community Impact Council Chair

After 3 years serving on the Community Impact Committee, it is interesting to reflect on how the applications we see before the Committee are often an early indication of the challenges working their way through the community. By late September 2024, we were already hearing about the difficulty in families finding the right supports for their children, the challenges people were facing in finding and securing employment and the ever-increasing need for deeply affordable housing. We could not have imagined then how these issues would become unignorable as growing economic uncertainty spread through our community.

I commend the volunteers for the time and effort they committed to this process. Our volunteers collectively committed to more than 540 hours, giving up fifteen of their evenings to support the integrity of this process. Increased applications meant that the decisions were more difficult due to insufficient resources to meet the needs. This is exactly why the Community

Impact Council is so crucial to the work of United Way Oxford. As social and financial pressures continue to increase, this group of volunteers use their community and expert knowledge to make wise investment recommendations that we believe will result in the most meaningful community impact possible.

I am not discouraged by how difficult the process was this past year. I am proud that the process we have in place allows us to rise to the challenge when times are tough. While not easy, I know that everyone who represents United Way Oxford can feel confident with the decisions we have made, knowing that the advice and support have come from such caring, competent, and pragmatic volunteers who are committed to a rigorous investment process.

Thank you to each of them for contributing their time and valuable advice to United Way Oxford for the benefit of our Board of Directors, Staff Team, Donors and Community Partners.

The Oxford Supplies4Students program, which launched in 2016 following two years of planning meetings, was designed to lend a helping hand to families who were struggling financially to ensure that their children would be well-equipped and ready to learn for back to school. The program was developed as a collaboration between local organizations, including United Way Oxford, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Oxford County, Oxford County Community Health Centre, Children's Aid Society of Oxford, Operation Sharing and Salvation Army. All gift cards are distributed through our local School Boards. Supplies4Students was created to provide meaningful help in a dignified manner that allows parents to purchase what they actually need to support their child.

2-1-1 PROVIDES HELP IN OXFORD COUNTY

2-1-1, Canada's Information & Referral hotline, connects callers to non-emergency government and community programs and services, including housing, health, meal programs and settlement services. It is co-founded by United Way Centraide Canada and its members, including United Way Oxford. Knowing where to turn for help isn't always easy, but 2-1-1 is there to help, 24/7. It is a free, confidential and multilingual program with trained professionals to guide callers to the support they need.

Last year, **928** Oxford County residents called or texted 211 for assistance; many others utilized the online supports at www.211ontario.ca to search for the information they required.



TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

In May 2023, following our purchase and renovation of a 7-bedroom home in Tillsonburg, United Way Oxford opened our Tillsonburg Light House, a transitional housing program with on-site staffing.

Safe, welcoming, supportive, and deeply affordable housing is key to addressing the homelessness crisis, and that is what we are providing. Since opening, we have been able to house and assist over 25 individuals - helping them to get back on their feet and move forward to stable, secure and independent living. This type of housing support is considered a best practice to help those who have experienced homelessness or are facing housing instability. The program allows an individual to live there for up to 364 days, and it is designed to help build life skills, make community connections and support the unique needs of each resident.

Based on the success of our Tillsonburg initiative, our Board committed to expanding to better serve those in need. When Oxford County Council approved our application to their RFP for Transitional Housing in July 2024, we began searching for a house in Ingersoll that would meet our needs. Christmas came early when we purchased a home in December. That significant purchase would not have been possible without the support of Oxford County and the willingness of the Ingersoll Community Foundation to hold our mortgage, and the incredible commitment of VienWood, our project manager/contractor. Together, and with the on-site support provided by our partner, the Oxford County Community Health Centre, our house was renovated and ready to welcome tenants in April. We can't wait to provide housing for 6 individuals in the home, and witness their lives transform as they access the support they need to build a better future. The United Way Oxford Board is committed to doing our part to be a part of the solution to homelessness because we know that if not us, then who? "Never think it won't happen to you. My life changed in an instant, in ways that I never imagined. A lot of people are struggling with a lot of different things, and they don't always reach out for the help they need. After dealing with a lot of stress in my own personal life, I suffered a procedural seizure and an unexpected bipolar attack. This episode landed me in the hospital, with nowhere to go home to. Without the support of United Way's Light House, I would have ended up on the street, but instead, I'm here and feeling supported by Sarah and the resources that she has connected me with. I am truly learning more about the life skills I need to be successful and live independently again. I'm thankful that I was connected and got the help that I needed."

United Way's Sponsored Employee Program offers a dynamic opportunity for both personal and professional growth. Through this initiative, companies lend an employee to United Way Oxford for a 16-week term during the annual fall campaign. These Sponsored Employees become an integral part of the Resource Development Team, receiving mentorship and hands-on experience across the daily operations and community outreach efforts. Along the way, they build essential skills - like public speaking, time and project management, understanding community needs, donor and volunteer engagement, and collaboration. More than just a learning experience, they become ambassadors for change, inspiring workplaces and volunteers to join us in creating a healthier, more connected community for everyone.

In 2024, United Way Oxford welcomed Juli Franklin, from GM CAMI Assembly Plant/Unifor Local 88, to our team. Juli spent the fall with us, helping in all aspects of the fundraising campaign. She supported workplace presentations, organized special events such as the Student Stairclimb and On-Line Auction, managed data entry and clean up, and so much more.

"Stepping into the role of Sponsored Employee was a genuinely life-changing experience for me. Moving from an assembly line environment into the heart of United Way's work was a big adjustment, but it opened my eyes to the incredible power of our community. I quickly realized just how many people, workplaces, and programs United Way brings together to support those in need, making a meaningful impact in Oxford County every single day.

I came into this experience not really knowing what to expect, but I left with so much more than I ever imagined: a deeper understanding of local needs, lifelong friendships, new confidence in myself, and most importantly, a true sense of connection to my community. This work is about giving back in ways that create lasting change and help people get to where they need to be.

I am so grateful to GM CAMI Assembly Plant and Unifor Local 88 for making this opportunity possible and to the United Way team for welcoming me with open arms. This experience has inspired me to continue giving back and always to be part of something bigger than myself."



As an organization that prioritizes accountability and transparency - to our generous donors, our funded partners and our community stakeholders – the role of our Finance Committee is crucial. I would like to thank all the Finance Committee Members and the United Way staff for their hard work and commitment to maximizing the dollars we have for investment for the benefit of our community. I would also like to thank our auditors, MW & Co., for their support.

Following the incredible success of our Tillsonburg Light House transitional housing initiative that was launched in early 2023, United Way Oxford purchased a home in Ingersoll to become our new Ingersoll Light House in December 2024. This additional commitment to ensuring affordable and supportive housing support to help people get back on their feet and more towards a better future would not have been possible without the generous support of Oxford County, who provided a 10-year forgivable loan and the Ingersoll Community Foundation who provided the mortgage required to complete the project. This is community cooperation and collaboration in action!
